

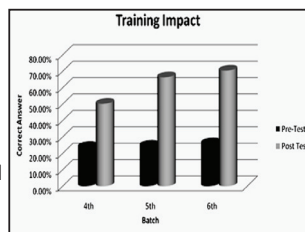
Refresher training for forest protectors in Papua



Jayapura (Indonesia), 9 to 12 August – Forest personnel need to be better trained and equipped in order for them to perform their duty more efficiently. As part of UNODC's Norwegian Government funded project 'Countering Illegal Logging and the linkage between Forest Crime and Corruption in Indonesia', three batches of workshop was carried out at the State Police School in Jayapura, Papua, for forest law enforcers.

To improve the capacity of law enforcement in the field, the focus of the workshop was on the training of the forest rangers, the personnel of the Rapid Reaction Forest Police Unit (SPORC) and civil servant investigators. Participants, in total of 78, were drawn from 12 districts in Papua.

The workshop covered training in areas such as crime investigation report, Government policy on forest protection and forest product management and administration and management of timber and non-timber forest products. Hong Kong anti-corruption advocate inspires Indonesian leaders



Jakarta (Indonesia), 11 August 2011 – In order to streamline the national reform effort and to progress the eradication of corruption, the Office of Vice President together with The National Development Planning Board, Transparency International Indonesia, Indonesia Corruption Watch, Partnership for Governance Reform and UNODC hosted the first 'Public Lecture for the Reformer'.

The anti-corruption advocate from Hong Kong, Mr. Tony Kwok, spoke before Indonesian leaders on his perception of how to fight corruption in Indonesia. In this context, he stressed with concern that KPK has only 160 investigators to monitor 4.7 million civil servants nationwide and a budget of Rp. 575.6 billion at their disposal.

Mr. Kwok has 35 years experience in the anti-corruption field, including 27 years of practical experience working in the Hong Kong Independent Commission against Corruption (ICAC) and 8 years as international anti-corruption specialist.

Cascade effect in training to clinch project sustainability



Banjarnegara (Indonesia), 17 to 19 August 2011 - Having being inspired by the UNODC's European Union funded District Commanders's Crime and Command Programme at the Jakarta Centre for Law Enforcement Cooperation (JCLEC), one of the graduated participants of the course, Banjarnegara District Police Chief, Superintendent Susetio Cahyadi, has taken the initiative to conduct a series of activities to improve the police professionalism, transparency and accountability in his district.

Superintendent Cahyadi presented sessions on command structure and critical incident command, counter terrorism strategy and drug trafficking. A session was also delivered to the group of staff from the Banjarnegara district to develop community engagement strategy and

to integrate "Good Policing" principles into their community policing programme. Another innovative initiative taken by Superintendent Cahyadi was to install cameras and audio equipment to monitor and control the operations of their police station.

These steps taken by the District Police Chief have proven the significant impact that the District Commanders's Crime and Command Programme is having in strengthening the leaderships and management capacity of the District Commanders.

UNODC counter- terrorism programme established in Indonesia



Jakarta (Indonesia), 23 August – After consultation meetings held in August 2010 and February 2011, the Government of Indonesia and UNODC established a National Programme Steering Committee for Partnership on Criminal Justice Responses to Terrorism.

Headed by the National Counter-Terrorism Agency, the Government of Indonesia is set to achieve the so-called East and Southeast Asia preparedness against terrorism and implement rule-of-law-based counter-terrorism measures. Other members of the programme steering committee include the Directorate of Security and Disarmament of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, National Development and Planning Board, Indonesian National Police, Attorney General's Office and Financial Transaction Reports Analysis Center.

Aspects of integrity to be incorporated in training material for Judges



Jakarta (Indonesia), 24 August – 'Strengthening Judicial Integrity and Capacity in Indonesia Phase III' Project began its activities to assist the Supreme Court in including Judicial Integrity into the judicial education standard focusing on candidate judges. A workshop was organised by the Judicial Reform Team and UNODC in order to elaborate and debate on the teaching materials covering this area.

The Supreme Court and Australia Indonesia Justice Partnership are other stakeholders of this project, which is in the stage of finalising teaching materials related to Code of Conduct and Bahasa Indonesia for adjudication purpose. UNODC is to ensure that all aspects of integrity are incorporated into each of teaching materials. In the future, these materials will be used for candidate of Judges focused in three Jurisdiction, namely General Court, Religious Court and Administrative Court.

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
