



## Promoting judicial integrity through candidate judges education



Bogor (Indonesia), 8 to 10 March 2012 – UNODC through its German funded project “Strengthening Judiciary Integrity and Capacity in Indonesia, Phase III” organised a Trainers Convention entitled “Candidate Judges Education Programme Training III: Curriculum Development on Adjudication Skills”. UNODC is working towards a greater impact on the integrity front by providing a new and systematic approach of integrity education to candidate judges as well as to overall judicial integrity education.

The involvement of UNODC in the development of training manual and materials aim to ensure that integrity, as a core value of a judicial officer, will be incorporated into each training module of candidate judges. The candidates will be appointed as judges serving in general court, administrative court and religious court jurisdiction throughout Indonesia.

## Indian activists share right-to-information insights with Indonesians



Jakarta, Depok, Medan and Makassar (Indonesia), 13 to 16 March 2012 – Jointly organized by UNODC and Indonesia’s Central Information Commission (KIP), and funded by the Embassy of Norway, for an India-Indonesia right-to-information seminar series “Right to Know, Fight to Know”, three eminent civil society activists from India toured the country. A key feature of each seminar was the sharing of anti-corruption and right-to-information experiences by citizens of Asia’s two largest democracies.

UNODC invited Mrs. Aruna Roy, Mr. Nikhil Dey and Ms. Sowmya Kidambi of Mazdoor Kisan Shakti Sangathan (MKSS) – the pioneer of right to information movement in India. Over 580 Indonesian participants attended in total, including local government officials, regional parliament members, civil society representatives, students, academia and media. The Norway-funded project “Strengthening the Capacity of Anti-Corruption Institutions in Indonesia” supports civil society activities to fight corruption and NGO networking to counter corruption.

## 1800th course participant graduates from Criminal Justice Management programme



Semarang (Indonesia), 16 March 2012 – UNODC’s Transnational Crime and Criminal Justice Project at the Jakarta Centre for Law Enforcement Cooperation (JCLEC) has trained over 1800 participants in two years. Initially, UNODC’s aim was to train 1800 law enforcement officials in three years, but this target was achieved much in advance. The last course was the Criminal Justice Management programme which

was designed to develop working relationships and improve common understandings between the judiciary, investigators in the Corruption and White Collar Crime Directorate of Indonesian National Police Criminal Investigation Division, prosecutors from the Special Crimes Division of the Attorney General’s Office and investigators from the Corruption Eradication Commission.

UNODC Transnational Crime and Criminal Justice Project is a three-year project funded by the European Union and designed to improve security by developing the investigative and management capacities of the Indonesia National Police and other law enforcement agencies. By developing and enhancing the skills of the trainers within these agencies the project hopes to create a sustainable multiplier effect that will reach across Indonesia and last for many years to come.


## The Government of Indonesia and UNODC jointly present the Indonesia Country Programme

Vienna (Austria), 20 March 2012 – Mr. Ajit Joy, UNODC Indonesia Country Manager and Dr. Diani Sadiawati, Director of Law and Human Rights of the National Development Planning Agency (BAPPENAS) jointly presented the recently approved UNODC Country Programme for Indonesia to donors of UNODC at its Headquarters in Vienna. The meeting was co-chaired by H.E. Mr. I Gusti Agung Wesaka Puja, Ambassador of the Republic Indonesia to Austria and Ms. Narumi Yamada, Officer-in-Charge for the Integrated Programme and Oversight Branch at the UNODC Headquarters. The briefing was organised as a platform to brief interested countries on the proposed sub-programmes and activities of the Country Programme.

The country programme for the years 2012-2015 gives a strategic vision to UNODC's work in Indonesia. Developed under the coordination of BAPPENAS and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Country Programme was the result of extensive consultations through 2011 with various government ministries and other stakeholders. The formal



agreement on the Indonesia Country Programme will be signed in May 2012 by Mr. Yury Fedotov, UNODC Executive Director, and Prof. Dr. Armida Alisjahbana, Minister for National Development Planning and Head of the National Development Planning Agency, when Mr. Fedotov is expected to visit Indonesia.



## Bali Regional Police to inhibit HIV and AIDS rate

Bali (Indonesia), 27 to 29 March 2012 – UNODC participated as facilitator at the “Training of Trainers on the Prevention of HIV and AIDS transmission for Bali Regional Police“. Organised by the Bali Provincial AIDS Commission and AusAID HIV Cooperation Program for Indonesia (HCPI), this training aim to enhance the capacity of the Indonesian National Police at the provincial and district commands in their duties - related to drug abuse as well as HIV and AIDS.

It is expected that police personnel can work with both health workers at community health centers, hospitals and other health institutions, as well as with the NGO outreach workers to suppress HIV and AIDS growth among injecting drug users. According to Bali Provincial Health Office, 5639 cases of HIV and AIDS recorded in Bali as per December 2011. 37 cases were found in the correctional institution.

## UNODC start workshops on UNCAC sensitization in Indonesia

Bandung (Indonesia), 28 March 2012 – As the Guardian of the United Nations Convention against Corruption (UNCAC), UNODC is to provide States with practical assistance and build the technical capacity needed to implement the Convention. Through the support of the European Union funded project ‘Support to the Fight Against Corruption’ and the Norway funded project ‘Strengthening the Capacity of Anti-Corruption Institutions in Indonesia’, UNODC in support of Corruption Eradication Commission

(KPK), National Development Planning Agency (BAPPENAS), Presidential Working Unit for Development Monitoring and Control (UKP-PPP), held a UNCAC sensitization session in Bandung, West Java. The event was the first of a series planned in various provinces in Indonesia throughout 2012.

The purpose of UNCAC sensitization in Indonesia is to enhance the knowledge and understanding of UNCAC for policy makers, Heads of Government, law enforcement officials, civil society and media in order to know and understand the provisions contained in the UNCAC, linked to the contents of Inpres No.17 year 2011 on corruption prevention and eradication actions and the recent implementation of Regional Action Plan on combating corruption (RAD-PK) at regional level.
