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Introduction

A. Objectives of the Tenth United Nations Survey of Crime Trends and Operations of Criminal Justice Systems

1. The United Nations Survey of Crime Trends and Operations of Criminal Justice Systems started in 1978, with the objective of collecting statistical data on the main components of criminal justice systems. The Economic and Social Council, in its resolution 1984/48 of 25 May 1984, requested the Secretary-General to maintain and develop the United Nations crime-related database by continuing to conduct surveys of crime trends and operations of criminal justice systems. Nine Surveys have been conducted so far.
2. Responding to the mandate of Council resolution 2005/23 of 22 July 2005¹, an open-ended expert group on ways and means of improving crime data collection, research and analysis with a view to enhancing the work of UNODC and other relevant international entities met in Vienna in February 2006.² Experts made recommendations to revise the questionnaire used for the United Nations Survey on Crime Trends and Operations of Criminal Justice Systems.
3. On the basis of the experts' recommendations, the questionnaire for the Tenth Survey was revised in a way that maintains continuity with the questionnaires for the Sixth, Seventh, Eighth and Ninth Surveys, which covered the period 1995-2004. Particular attention was given to improving and clarifying definitions, and collecting data on context and metadata (see Annex). Furthermore, collaboration with Interpol, the Statistical Office of the European Commission (Eurostat), and the European Sourcebook of Crime and Criminal Justice Statistics³ resulted in the alignment of several definitions across different international data collections.
4. The main goal of the Tenth Survey, covering the period 2005 -2006, is to collect data on the incidence of reported crime and the operations of criminal justice systems with a view to improving the analysis and dissemination of that information throughout the international community.
5. The data gathered by the Tenth Survey, as was the case in each of the previous sweeps of the survey, is critical in providing insights into overall global crime and criminal justice trends. The data builds on that already collected, providing a unique insight into global crime trends since the mid-1970s. Results may assist in providing an overview of relationships between various parts of the criminal justice system, to promote informed decision-making in administration, at the national and international levels, and to determine the most appropriate issues and areas for technical assistance.

B. Instructions for completing the questionnaire

1. The instructions in the paragraphs below should be carefully studied before the questionnaire is completed. The questionnaire is compiled in such a way that it can be divided up between different agencies and reassembled in the central responding office before it is returned. Partial replies should be reviewed by the coordinating office/ officer to ensure that the jurisdictions to which the data refer (for example, national or federal jurisdictions) are clearly defined and that the data are statistically valid. It is important to review the replies in all parts of the questionnaire for consistency. The coordinating officer is responsible for distributing the various parts of the questionnaire to the competent agencies and returning the complete responses to UNODC. 2. Respondents completing the tables are requested to keep the following in mind:
 - (a) If figures provided in one table differ significantly from one year to the next, the discrepancy should be explained in the space for comments to the table;
 - (b) If it is not possible to provide data as classified or defined in a table, an attempt should be made to adjust the data as far as possible and to describe the steps involved in the space for comments to the table;
 - (c) If data are not yet available for the requested year, provisional data or estimates may be inserted and noted accordingly;
 - (d) Please note that it will be assumed that tables/parts of tables left blank refer to information that is not available, unless specified in the relevant space for comments;
 - (e) In most cases, the calendar year should be used as the reporting period. Where some other annual period is used, such as a fiscal year not corresponding to the calendar year, that fact should be noted;
 - (f) Statistics on such matters as criminal justice personnel, court action and the prison population should include data from all levels of government, that is, from the national, state and local authorities.
