In Lagos, Nigeria, we commissioned Ship-in-a-Box; the first of its kind simulator in the region, which will improve the quality & frequency of training while reducing safety risks with the conduct of exercises at sea.

This facility, built by UNODC through its Global Maritime Programme for the Nigerian Navy, will enhance the capacity of maritime law enforcement personnel in the conduct of Visit, Board, Search & Seizure Operations.
