Preventing corruption

by promoting integrity and good governance and helping recover stolen assets



Countering terrorism

through effective, accountable and inclusive legal, crime prevention and criminal justice measures in line with international norms and the UN Global Counter Terrorism Strategy



Combating organized crime

by providing technical assistance and support and strengthening international cooperation to address organized criminal activity and all forms of trafficking



UNODC's normative, research and technical assistance work are mutually reinforcing, which helps us to work with governments and other stakeholders to rapidly identify new trends and threats, develop effective responses to counter them and support Member States in taking strategic action.

Role as guardian of international crime and corruption conventions and Secretariat of global UN policy bodies on drugs, crime and corruption ensures normative support for multilateral policymaking

Partnerships

UNODC cooperates with a wide range of stakeholders to maximize the impact of our work. These include governments, civil society organizations, academic and research institutions, the private sector, international and regional organizations and other UN entities.

We also foster South-South cooperation between countries facing similar challenges to share know-how and good practices.

Funding
