1 PARTNER PROJECT

1.1 Background

Afghanistan is the world's largest producer of opium with poppy cultivation posing a significant threat both domestically and abroad. Afghanistan accounted for some 85 per cent of global opium production, supplying some 80% of all opiate users in the world.

The country is facing a significant drug use problem as one in three households have been affected by drug use. The 2015 Afghanistan National Drug Use Survey (ANDUS)¹ indicated that 11% of the country population (2.9 to 3.5 million people) were tested positive for narcotic drugs. Furthermore, around 690,000 - 850,000 females used drugs in Afghanistan, while 1 to 1.2 million children were tested positive for narcotic drugs, predominantly opium/opioid.

While the use of drugs such as cannabis and opiates are well established in Afghanistan, the past decade has seen an expansion of use of synthetic drugs such as methamphetamine, especially in the youth population. The non-medical use of pharmaceutical opioids and tranquilizers is also commonly reported among the adult population. Approximately 10% of new HIV infections worldwide are attributed to injecting drug use, often of an opiate such as heroin.

Heroin and other opioid dependence cause significant morbidity and mortality; it is a chronic and enduring condition that often requires long-term treatment and care.

Opioid substitution therapy (substitution of illicit opioid use with a non-injecting, free of charge, pure and healthy opioid agonist medication) is one of the most well-established, most effective, and evidence-based international standard treatment approaches for people who use opioids. Pharmacological interventions for the management of drug withdrawal are part of the interventions recommended by WHO/UNODC in its International standards for the treatment of drug use disorders.

OST has proven effective in reducing risky behaviors associated with opioid use, reducing morbidity and mortality among people who use/inject drugs, and improving the psychological, emotional, and physical wellbeing as well as the mental health of clients. OST is also effective in improving the quality of life, the economic situation and the integration into family and community of people who use/inject drugs.

Scaling up the existing Opioid Substitution Therapy (OST) programmes is an essential part of responding to problematic drug use in Afghanistan. The medication most used for OST in the country is methadone.

To address drug use and its related disorders by increasing Afghans' access to integrated, qualitative, and comprehensive drug use disorder services, UNODC in collaboration with World Health Organization (WHO) implements an EU funded project on *"Increasing access of vulnerable populations in Afghanistan to qualitative and comprehensive Mental Health and Psychosocial Support and drug use disorder services"*. Within the framework of this project and under this Call for Proposals (CFP), the UNODC invites eligible not-for-profit civil society organizations to apply for a partnership with UNODC to implement the activities that promote evidence-based and voluntary

drug treatment services with an approach focusing on health care integration, community-based intervention and comprehensive continuum of care.

UNODC seeks to partner with an organization that has the following experience:

- Demonstrated prior experience of at least three years implementing activities in the area of Drug Demand Reduction (DDR) and Harm Reduction Services, particularly in Opioid Substitution Therapy (OST);
- Demonstrated working experience with major multilateral/ or bilateral donors and programmes;
- Presence or past relevant working experience in any of the targeted provinces (Herat and Nimroz)
- Working experience with Key Population (people who use drugs);

1.2 Objectives and scope of work

This Call for Proposals takes into consideration the importance of harnessing all available resources towards the implementation of activities aimed at meeting the objectives of this partner programme.

The main objective of this project is to reduce morbidity and mortality among opioid users through increasing access to qualitative and comprehensive Opioid Substitution Therapy Services in Afghanistan.

Specific objectives are:

- To provide OST services based on national OST guideline/protocol, WHO/UNODC Standards, regional and global recommendations.
- To support reduction in injecting behaviors, prevent spread of HIV, Hepatitis B and Hepatitis C among people who use/inject drugs.
To reduce the drug-induced health hazards (ex; wounds, phlebitis, thromboses, emboli, septicemia, bacteremia and abscess) as well as economic and social hazards of drug use disorders

A detailed scope of work is attached in **Annex 1**.

1.3 Location

Activities will be implemented in in Herat and Nimroz provinces in Afghanistan.

1.4 Duration

All activities must be implemented within the period in the agreement (up to 12 months).

1.5 Fundamental principles

Applicants are expected to consider the following fundamental principles in designing their project proposals:

- An approach that values diversity among men and women;
- Implementation of the project based on international standards and guidelines.
- Partnership/collaboration/cooperation with other stakeholders
- Sustainability of project activities

1.6 Budget

The budget to implement the project is **USD 139,931**.

In addition, partners can apply for indirect costs (Project Support Cost – PSC) which cannot exceed 6% of the total direct costs indicated above.

The following costs **will not be considered as eligible** under this project:

- credit or loan schemes;
- debts and provisions for losses or debts;
- interest owed;
- cash donations;
- items already financed in another framework, i.e. existing capacity should not be included in the budget;
- currency exchange losses;
- credit to third parties

2 ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

2.1 Eligibility of applicants

In order to be eligible, applicants must:

- be non-profit making organization (CSOs including NGOs, CBOs) registered under the relevant Laws of Afghanistan and/or with a legal permit to operate in the country;
- have an annual income/budget from the most recent completed fiscal year (2021 or 2022) which is not exceeding the project budget;
- have a bank account capable of receiving international deposit;
- be directly responsible for the preparation and management of the project, i.e. not acting as an intermediary

Applicants must conduct a self-assessment using the checklist provided (Annex 3- Self-assessment of eligibility) and sign off that **all criteria are met**, and that the applicant is able to provide proof, if selected to continue to the next phase of the process.

3 APPLICATION PROCEDURE

This Call for Proposals will take a phased 2 step approach:

Interested applicants are to first submit a **concept note** which will be reviewed by an Evaluation Panel composed of representatives from United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime.

Shortlisted applicants will be contacted by UNOV/UNODC with an invitation to submit a **full project proposal** and to register at the [UN Partner Portal](#).

Additional instructions including the necessary application forms and annexes will be provided only to shortlisted applicants.

The application forms and annexes for each phase must be submitted using the file format (i.e. Word, Excel) and respective given templates, without altering them. For documents requiring signatures from the organization's representative, a scanned copy of the document including the hand signature, or an electronically signed PDF must be submitted.

Concept note applications must be submitted by email to unodc-afghanistanproposal@un.org, marked "CfP_OST_organizationname_2023MMDD"² in the subject line. Applications sent by any other means (e.g. by fax or by mail) or delivered to other addresses will not be considered under this Call for Proposals. All the documents including the annexes must be submitted in **English**.

The deadline for the submission of concept notes is **7 June 2023, 23:59 (Afghanistan Time, UTC+4:30)** as evidenced by the date of receipt of submission email. Any application submitted after the deadline will be automatically rejected. The deadline for the submission of full project proposals will be communicated separately to short-listed applicants.

Only one application per applicant will be accepted. Multiple applications from the same applicant will result in automatic disqualification. The application must cover the entire scope of the project.

Due care must be taken to complete the application forms. Incomplete applications will be rejected, and any error or major discrepancy within the application forms and annexes may lead to rejection of the application. Please note that only the application forms and the completed annexes will be evaluated. It is therefore of utmost importance that these documents contain ALL relevant information concerning the project.

Documents will be checked for truthfulness and accuracy of representation through various means, including but not limited to internet searches, formally official confirmation from responsible offices, letters of recommendation, etc.

3.1 Concept Note

A **concept note** must be submitted in accordance with the instructions in the concept note application form (Annex 2). The concept note aims to give a compact overview of the proposed project and its rationale, including its context, aims, key activities.

The following documents must be submitted:

- Concept note application form (template provided, Annex 2)
- Self-assessment of eligibility (template provided, Annex 3)

4 EVALUATION PROCEDURE

4.1 Phase 1 - Technical assessment of concept notes

The quality of the concept notes will be assessed in accordance with the evaluation criteria set out in the evaluation grid below.

Each subsection will be given a score in accordance with the following guidelines:

0 = information not provided/ does not meet any of the criteria, 1 = poorly meets the criteria; 2 = adequately meets the criteria; 3 = entirely meets the criteria.

Following the evaluation of eligible concept notes, the applications are ranked according to their scores and a shortlist is defined by the evaluation team.

Only shortlisted applications will then be contacted by UNODC with the invitation for the submission of a full project proposal including a detailed budget.

4.2 Phase 2: Technical assessment of full project proposals

If the applicant has successfully submitted a concept note and been selected to participate in the next round of the application process, they will receive an email from UNODC with additional templates and information that must be provided to be considered in the final round. This includes registration and completion of an up-to-date profile at the [UN Partner Portal](#).

During initial project planning and when preparing the concept note, it may help to know that shortlisted applicants will be asked to provide detailed information in the following areas (if selected to participate in Phase 2):

- A clear understanding of and application of effective, evidence-based OST services in line with International Standards and guidelines.
- A clear understanding of challenges faced in existing substance use treatment and care services, particularly OST and proposition of innovative strategies ensuring efficiency and improvement of services.
- A clear understanding of the direct beneficiaries and the indirect beneficiaries;
- A clear and structured monitoring and evaluation plan;
- A detailed budget, including an explanation and justification of the budget items;

5 APPROVAL AND AWARD

The provisionally selected applicants will be subject to the full administrative capacity assessment and review by the UNODC Committee on Grants and External Engagements (COGEE), based on which the approval will be granted.

Only successful applicants will be informed in writing of UNODC's decision concerning their application.
