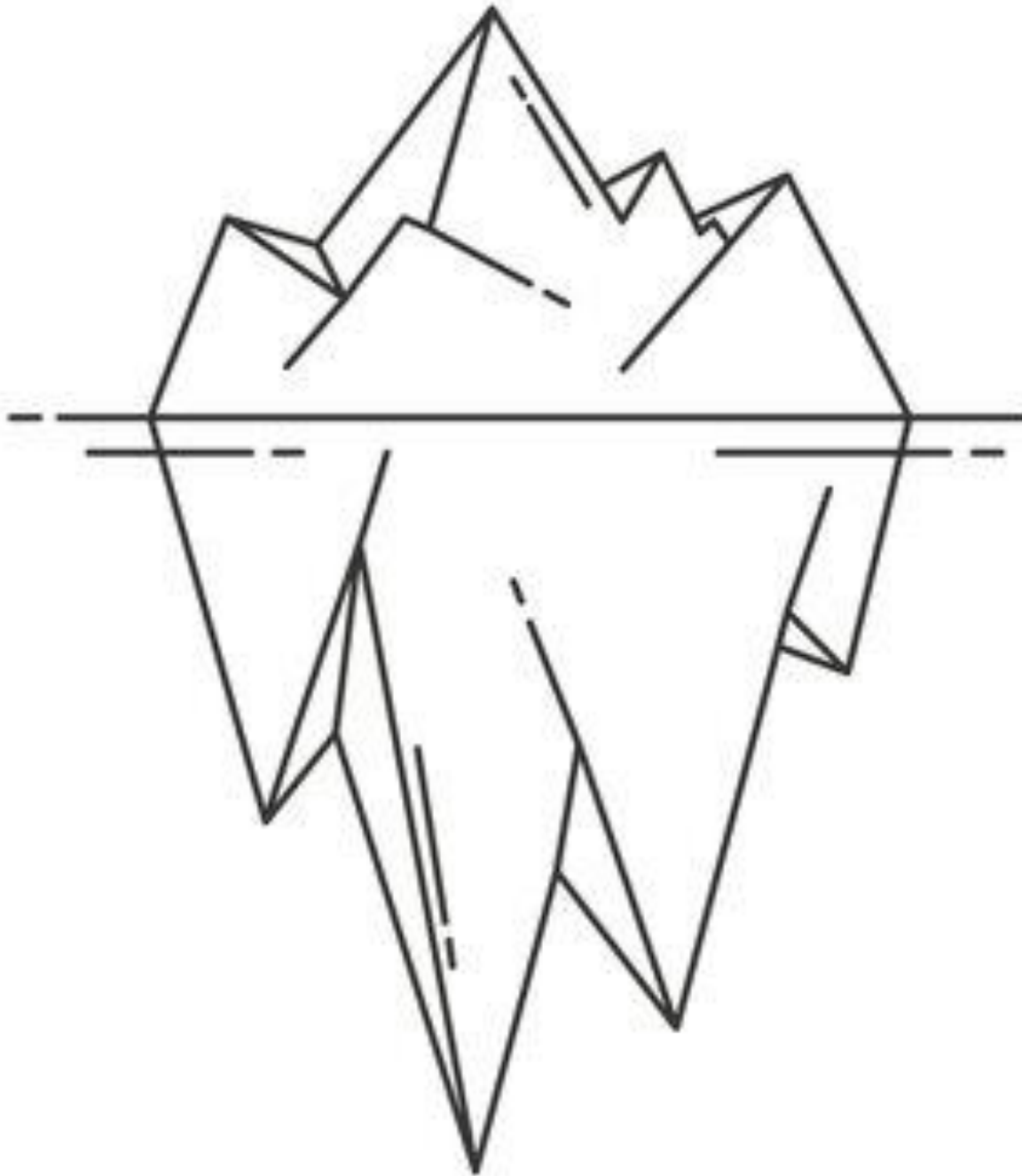

The UN Standard Minimum Rules for the Treatment of Prisoners are universally acknowledged minimum standards

- > “The Nelson Mandela Rules” represent, as a whole, the minimum conditions accepted as suitable by the United Nations
- + The UN Rules for the Treatment of Women Prisoners and Non-custodial Measures for Women Offenders (the Bangkok Rules)
- + The UN Standard Minimum Rules for Non-custodial Measures (the Tokyo Rules)
