



Delphine Agoguet, Magistrate, member of the French General Inspection of Justice.

Delphine Agoguet first practiced as a lawyer at the Paris Bar for 10 years. She graduated from the Paris Mediation and Negotiation Training Institute and joined the National School for the Judiciary in 1999.

She worked as a criminal court judge and judge responsible for enforcing sentences and, later joined the Ministry of Justice Headquarters as Deputy Public Prosecutor at the Directorate of Judicial Services, then at the Delegation for European and International Affairs within the General Secretariat of the Ministry of Justice, where she was responsible for the Comparative Law Office. She coordinated several European programs aiming at improving legislative cooperation, comparative legal terminology, and legal translation.

In 2015, she joined the General Justice Inspectorate attached to the French Minister of Justice, where she is in charge of European and international activities as well as of the General Delegation for the European network of national justice inspection authorities of the EU.

She is the co-author of the report "Justice for the environment" presented to the French Ministers of Justice and Ecology in October 2019. This report led to the Law of 24 December 2020 which created regional courts specialized in environmental offenses, technical assistance, and environmental judicial police officers supporting these jurisdictions. In conjunction with the legislative departments and directorates of the Ministry of Justice, she is currently in charge of a support mission aiming at implementing this legislation in the relevant jurisdictions and drafting a methodology to adapt the current judicial organization to environmental justice.

Delphine Agoguet is in charge of a teaching module entitled "the judge confronted to the climate crisis" at Sciences Po Paris.
