

First National Workshop for Measuring Illicit Financial Flows associated with trafficking in persons in Nepal

As custodian agencies of SDG Indicator 16.4.1 on illicit financial flows (IFFs), in 2020 the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) and the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD), together with the Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP), inaugurated a new Development Account **project called “Statistics and data for measuring illicit financial flows in the Asia-Pacific region”¹**. The project is aimed at consolidating existing and testing new methodological guidelines for the measurement of this Indicator, as well as to build statistical capacity by providing technical assistance and guidance to pilot countries using the defined standards and concepts developed by UNCTAD and UNODC. The project is implemented in six countries of Asia, including Nepal.

In November 2021, with the support of the Central Bureau of Statistics, a National Coordination Mechanism (NCM)² through a National Committee has been set up among key national stakeholder and data providers to support the project implementation during 2021 and 2022 in Nepal. After meetings with the key national data providers, data availability assessment and interviews were carried out to map data sources and collect data on trafficking in persons (TiP), drug trafficking and related IFFs in the country. Key information is collected also through qualitative interviews with experts from relevant institutions. Status of data availability and early findings will be shared to the participants of this workshop.

The first National Workshop for Measuring Illicit Financial Flows associated with trafficking in persons (TiP) in Nepal will be held on **Tuesday, 22 March** and will gather representatives from Nepal national institutions and key stakeholders with expertise on trafficking in persons and the related illicit financial flows. With the ultimate goal to build capacity of the national authorities and relevant stakeholders to collect data and measure such types of IFFs in the country, the workshop will cover the following activities:

- Officially launch the Trafficking in Persons National Coordination Mechanism
- Present the conceptual framework for the statistical measurement of illicit
