What's new on UNODC eLearning

The UNODC Global eLearning Programme is designed to offer on-demand capacity building online and off-line to stakeholders around the globe on contents related to UNODC staff. The eLearning Online Platform currently bears over 3200 users. The tailored training courses are developed by UNODC in collaboration with international experts and correspond directly to needs of Member States. They are comprised of subjects including Human Rights, HIV/AIDS, Drugs and Transnational Crime, Smuggling of Migrants, Human Trafficking, Border Control, Wildlife Crime, Forensics and Intelligence. As of July 2015, 20 courses have been delivered by the UNODC, including a total of 227 modules in 11 languages. In 2015, GLOU61 delivered services, software, hundreds of eLearning modules in localised languages and English, updated hardware, platforms, transformed 2 CBT centres into full eLearning centres in Sri Lanka, trained more than 35 officials from Sri Lanka, Thailand, China, Cambodia, Vietnam, Myanmar, Lao, Indonesia and Timor Leste, as well as organised the Programme Steering Committee and facilitated the Independent Evaluation of the project. What is eLearning?

eLearning is the use of electronic educational technology in learning and teaching. The term "eLearning" was coined in 1999, during a computer-based seminar in Los Angeles. The term is now commonly utilised to describe the use of online, personalised, interactive or virtual education as well as a method of providing distance learning services.

eLearning enables countries, as well as private and international organizations, to disseminate information and provide customised knowledge as tool for capacity building and optimizing resources, on a global scale.

eLearning Training in Lao PDR

August: eLearning Training conducted in Laos and Indonesia

As of August 2015, Lao PDR has trained 15 officers, through the use of the Mobile Training Unit, including officers from the International Relationship Department, Immigration Department as well as the Public Security Subject matters covered during the training included: Introduction to Smuggling on Migrants, Investigative Approaches to Smuggling on Migrants and Investigative Techniques to Counter the Smuggling on Migrants. Moreover, 20 Participants in Indonesia have been trained during the Cybercrime Training from 3 to 14th August 2015. During their free time, the participants have further managed to obtain 71 certificates on all the Bahasa modules, illegal logging and Cyber Crime modules.

September: Final Evaluation Results at FinGov

On 7 September 2015, the Global eLearning Project invited all donors of the GLOU61 Project to the FinGov meeting to present the final results of the evaluation of the Global eLearning Project and discuss future steps of the project.

New modules available

As of September 2014, Wildlife and Forest Crime is additionally available on the eLearning platform in Lao, as well as, the Preliminary Observation for Land Controls in Bahasa.

October: eLearning training delivered in Indonesia and Cambodia

From the 19 – 30th of October, the JCLEC ran an eLearning training for 20 participants on Counter Terrorism Investigation Management, funded by the United Kingdom. The training was specifically designed for the personnel of the Indonesian Police Anti-Terror Force, known as the Special Detachment 88 Anti-Terrorism unit. On top of the eLearning session conducted,

ELEARNING COURSES

The UNODC Global eLearning Programme offers **228 training modules** delivered through **21 courses in English, Thai** (11 modules), **Sinhala** (32 modules), **Bahasa** (9 modules), **Spanish** (3 modules), **Burmese** (4 modules), **Khmer** (3 modules), **Chinese** (3 modules), **Lao** (5 modules), **Vietnamese** (7 modules) and **French** (1 module). The platform offers **64 modules** thus far translated into the above languages. In addition, the Online platform offers free courses on Human Rights and HIV/AIDS to all initial users as well as UNODC staff members.

participants were encouraged to undertake further eLearning classes to improve training. It has been reported that the eLearning training has greatly benefited the participants. Further modules including, Smuggling of Migrants and Performing a Car Search have been completed in the spare time after the eLearning training session. Furthermore, 4 eLearning training courses have been conducted in Cambodia and completed by Participants of the BLO's staff. Many of these participants work for important and relevant institutions such as, immigration, Anti-Narcotics, Custom & Excise, Military Police, CamControl, Border Police and Border Army



November: eLearning training conducted in India

The National Academy of Customs Excise & Narcotics in Faridabad conducting eLearning training courses from the 23rd November to the 4th December. A further 2 day eLearning training was took place from the 30th November to 1st December for the Bhutanese delegates as a part of their training curriculum.

eLearning training in Sri Lanka

eLearning training has been conducted in Sri Lanka on two accounts in October. 31 male and 5 female officers have completed the course 'Crime Investigating & Drugs organised Crimes', which consists of 10 modules. Further eLearning training on Police Officers and Crime Scene Awareness has been undertaken by 110 Probationary Sub Inspectors. Moreover, an additional third training was followed up on Crime Investigation and Drug Organised Crimes. The training was attended by 6 male officers and 6 female officers.
