Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provide access to justice for all and build effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels



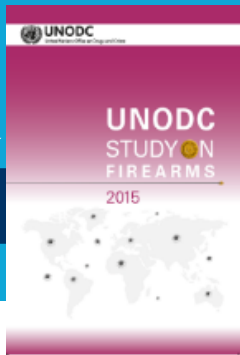
Nexus Between Illicit Arms and Development

16.4 By 2030, significantly reduce illicit financial and arms flows, strengthen the recovery and return of stolen assets and combat all forms of organized crime

16.4.2 Proportion of seized, found or surrendered arms whose illicit origin or context has been traced or established by a competent authority in line with international instruments

2015

The **2030 SDGs** are adopted and, subsequently, **UNODC and UNODA** are designated **co-custodians** of target indicator 16.4.2.



2010 - 2015

UNODC is mandated by COP to develop the **Firearms Study** (res. 5/4, 6/2). The first UNODC Study on Firearms is **published in 2015**.

April 2017

Start of **EU-UNODC Project** on Firearms data collection and analysis

14 June 2018

The IAFQ 2018 is **launched**.

2018 – 2019

Regional meetings on firearms data collection and analysis, Technical assistance activities

October 2019

Cross-regional meeting on firearms trafficking to, from and across the EU

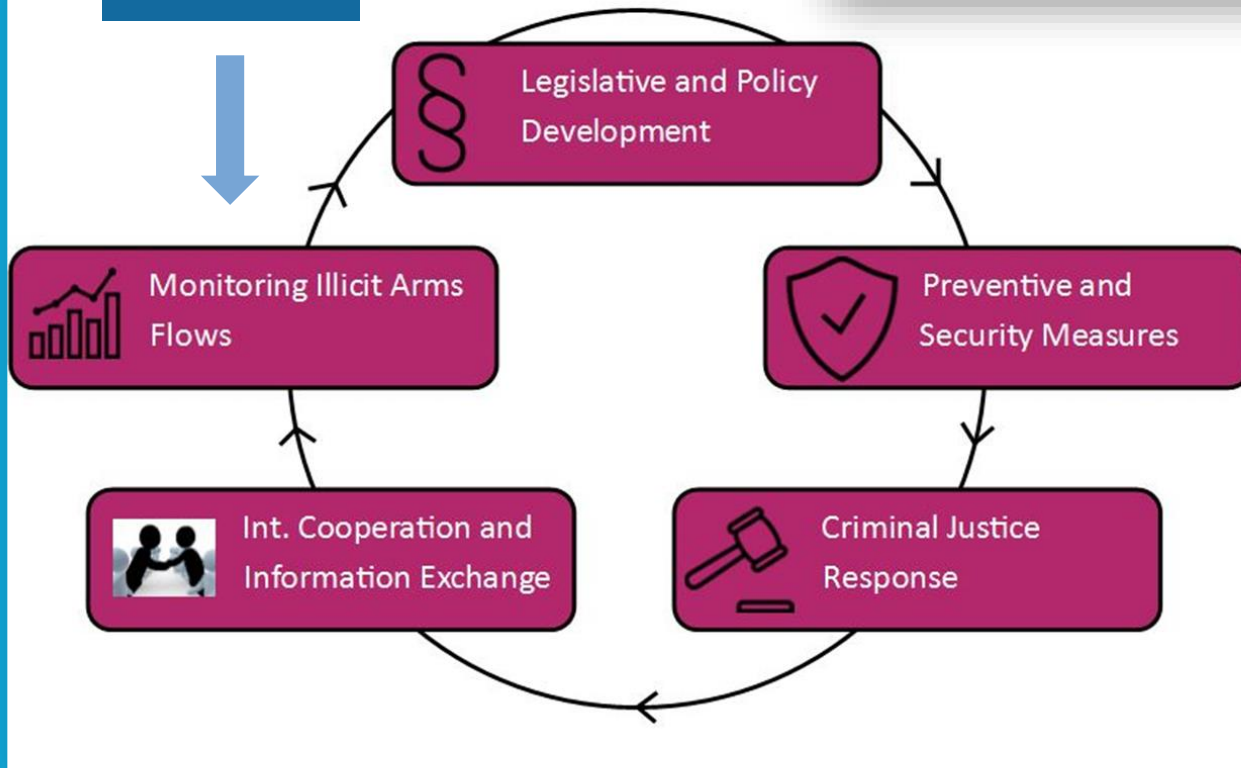
2016

UNODC is mandated by the COP “to **continue to collect and analyse**, on a regular basis, quantitative and qualitative information and suitably disaggregated data on trafficking in **firearms, their parts and components and ammunition**” and to take into account **target 16.4** of the SDGs (res. 8/3).

Immediate next step

Launch of the Global Study on Firearms Trafficking.

First underlying principle of the initiative:

Linking law enforcement and statistical efforts

The initiative is not a purely statistical exercise.

As relevant data comes from the criminal justice system, technical assistance activities as well as efforts to obtain more qualitative information mainly target criminal justice practitioners.

Efforts are being made to reach out to national statistical structures and to raise their awareness on the topic of illicit firearms.

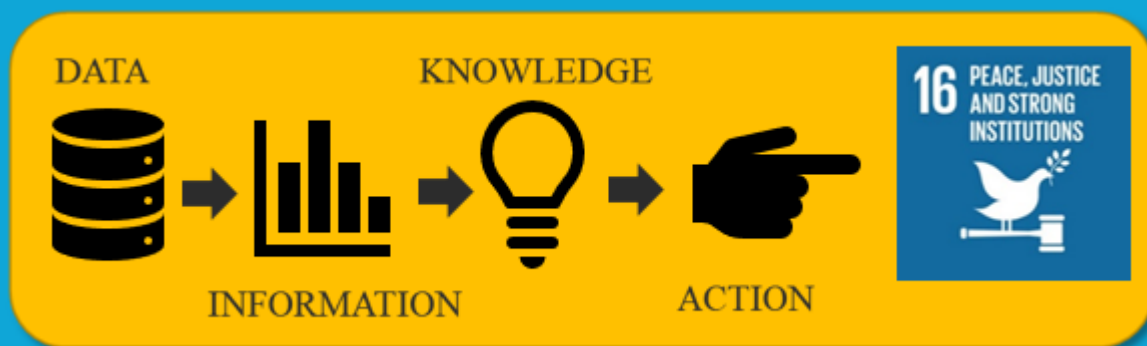


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Second underlying principle of the initiative:

From Data to Action



Bringing the data collected and analysed at global level back to its Member States, with a view to fostering the use of the data for strategic and operational purposes in the fight against illicit trafficking in firearms, their parts and components and ammunition.



Objectives and Opportunities of the Meeting

- Develop a common understanding on:
 - The nature, scope and modus operandi regarding illicit firearms trafficking to, from and across the EU;
 - The implications of this understanding as regards law enforcement and prosecutorial action to counter the phenomenon;
 - The way forward in enhancing the evidence-base on illicit firearms flows, in increasing international cooperation and in addressing trafficking to, from and across the EU.
- Identify and create opportunities to enhance inter-institutional as well as international cooperation and information exchange.
