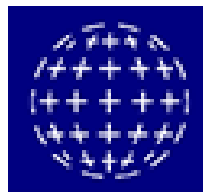

	Mr. Jim Clancy Mr. Simon Derry Mr. Raymond Louw Mr. Petter Mejlænder  Objective: Objective: In recognition of the difficulties faced by journalists in many countries and in the spirit of solidarity, participating journalists will issue a statement and present it to the Plenary of the Conference. The statement will: (a) capture the outcome of the Forum; (b) reiterate their “watchdog” role vis-à-vis countries’ compliances with the Convention; (c) bring to notice issues related to freedom of press, necessary to enable independent journalism. In order to guarantee continuity, the same media representatives attending the Bali Forum will be invited to the third Conference, to be held in late 2009, where their coverage of governments’ anticorruption efforts will serve as a springboard to assess countries’ performance and ability to keep to their commitments.
