### Our New Planned Approach

**Revolutionise** way anti-corruption is taught



I. Integrate in all courses, e.g.

- *anti-trust*: private corruption;
- *PIL*: conventions against corruption;
- *criminal law*: international corruption related crime;
- *mining/energy law*: corruption issues in particular sector + responses;
- *professional ethics*: importance in practice;
- ...
