Article 11

- (1) Bearing in mind independence of the judiciary, States shall take measures to strengthen integrity and to prevent opportunity for corruption. Such measures may include conduct rules.**

- (2) Measures to the same effect may be introduced and applied within the prosecution service where it does not form part of the judiciary.**
