Corruption is an enormous obstacle to the realization of human rights and can also lead to human rights violations. Anti-corruption measures therefore contribute to the effective enjoyment of human rights. Effective implementation of human rights contributes to building a corruption-free society. Aligning anti-corruption efforts with human rights promotion and protection has the potential to create synergies and will be mutually beneficial. A human rights-based approach to anti-corruption means putting the international human rights entitlements and claims of the people (the 'right-holders') and the corresponding obligations of the State (the 'duty-bearer') in the centre of the anti-corruption debate and efforts at all levels, and integrating international human rights principles including non-discrimination and equality, participation and inclusion, accountability, transparency, and the rule of law.
