ACCESS TO INFORMATION ESSENTIAL FOR PUBLIC CONFIDENCE AND NATIONAL INTEGRITY

In commemorating the International Day of Universal Access to Information on September 28, TIPNG called on the Government of Papua New Guinea and State Agencies to work to deliver on recent legislation that supports citizens’ right to know.

At TIPNG, we welcome the Open Data requirements enacted in the Digital Government Act 2022 and we reiterate civil society’s expectation that the Government and national institutions collaborate to make public information accessible to all citizens in accordance with Section 51 of the PNG Constitution.

“Papua New Guineans have a right to know what is done by public officials, with public money for the public good and it is incumbent on our government and national institutions to deliver on this constitutional right. We have recently seen in our 2022 National General Election how the lack of timely, accessible and accurate information undermined public confidence and weakened electoral integrity. This is true across the entirety of the public sector, access to information is essential for public confidence and national integrity,” said Peter Aitsi, TIPNG Board Chair.

“TIPNG welcomes recent legislated requirements in the Digital Government Act 2022 that compels state agencies

to maintain standards of Open Data for citizens to access public information. These legislative developments led by Secretary and Department of ICT, alongside national commitments in the Open Government Partnership, to enact a comprehensive Freedom of Information Act and for increased fiscal transparency should be supported by all sectors of society, including the Private Sector and international development partners.”

The Right to Information complements other civic rights including Freedom of Association and Freedom of Speech. Recent statements by the Government restricting domestic and international media from making information public, provisions within the Cybercrime Act, and self-interested censorship by public officials undermine these reforms, and must be opposed.

Section 36 of the Digital Government Act 2022 requires the State to develop open data principles that shall have regard to public use of data across all sectors and to ensure that any open data is easily discoverable and available. Further, the Act requires that Public Bodies shall that open data kept up to date in an automated way. There requirements will be further articulated in the forthcoming National Digital Government Plan 2023-2027.





FROM THE HELM

Dear Members and Friends,

The third quarter of this year was focused on reflecting on the constitutional aspirations of Papua New Guinea.

As the country conducted its tenth National General Election since independence, we fielded over 300 observers across all 4 regions, in a total of 20 provinces. TIPNG's observers were accredited with the PNG Electoral Commission and were comprised of volunteers from across the country. We are grateful to all of them for committing their time to defend democracy in PNG.

Following the observation, we issued a summary paper which contained the stark observation that the 2022 National General Election has continued the trend of deterioration in the quality of elections in PNG. In the paper, we called for increase in transparency and integrity, to restore public trust in the electoral process.

Our call for transparency was re-emphasized in our commemoration of International Access to Information Day. We marked the day by calling for the provisions on Open Data in the Digital Government Act 2022 to be supported by state agencies, in line with our constitutional right to access public documents.

In September our team took the opportunity of Independence Day celebrations, to visit the former House of Assembly, the National Parliament and the National Museum. We learned about our history, our political aspirations and the importance of our national identity in the fight against corruption. These reflections on national identity and national integrity, were also a feature of our Active Civic Engagement (ACE) workshop conducted with youth partners in Bougainville, and occurring in the same month.

As you read through this issue of our newsletter, you will see time and again, people coming together to stand up for what is right and proper, and to stand against corruption. We thank you for your interest in our work, and hope we can depend on your support in that ongoing fight.

INTERNATIONAL ACCESS TO INFORMATION DAY

On September 28, we joined our partners in the law and justice sector at a public event organized by the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime as part of its public awareness on International Day for Universal Access to Information.

The event was held at the Nature Park in Port Moresby and was targeted at sharing information with the public on the impacts of corruption and citizens' right to information.

TIPNG set up a stall and shared information about our efforts in empowering people in Papua New Guinea to oppose corruption across all sectors of society and most importantly the work we do in pushing for the Freedom of Information legislation.

The public event was part of the PNG Anti-Corruption Project, implemented by the UN Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) and the UN Development Programme (UNDP), with funding support from the European Union. Access to information enables the detection and reporting of corruption. It is also critically important for promoting accountability, transparency and effectiveness of government institutions.

International Day for Access to Information supports the idea that everyone has the basic right to seek, receive and disseminate information. This right is also linked to the right to freedom of expression. Access to Information builds a ground for a fight against corruption.

The right to information is necessary for making decisions, engaging in democracy, and increasing openness and transparency between the government and its people so that they can know how they are being governed and how the country's resources are being managed.

The event at Nature Park saw students sharing information and insights on the impact of corruption and the extent of access to information. Other organizations that participated at the event were the Interim ICAC Office, the National Judicial Staff Services and the UN Office of the Human Rights Commissioner.

What is Right to Information?

Access to information gives citizens the right by law to access public documents and data from government departments and state entities. It often occurs through Right to Information laws. With Right to Information laws, citizens can legally be allowed to get all information and documents from the government or state agency.

Current Status in Papua New Guinea

Papua New Guinea does not have the Right to Information Act or policy even though Section 51 of our National Constitution gives Papua New Guinean citizens the right. The Constitution of the country enshrines the right of access to information and stipulates that a law should be adopted on this matter, but no Right to Information law has been passed in the last 40 years.

Section 51 of the Papua New Guinea Constitution stipulates that *“Every citizen has the right of reasonable access to official documents, subject only to the need for such secrecy as is reasonably justifiable in a democratic society.”* It also lists exceptions related to this secrecy.

The Constitution also sets out that a law may regulate or restrict the right to information and *“provision shall be made by law to establish procedures by which citizens may obtain ready access to official information.”* There is some good news, and that is that the Government of Papua New Guinea has already committed to drafting an RTI Law through the Open Government Partnership (OGP) National Action Plan 2018-2020, which was endorsed by cabinet in NEC Decision No. 323/2018. However, the challenge now to ensure that they (PNG Government)

put in place an effective law that empowers Papua New Guineans to demand accountability from all public offices and office-holders.

How does Right to Information affect you?

Right to Information is not only a human right, but vital for preventing corruption. When citizens can access key facts, data and information from the government, it makes it more difficult to hide abuses of power and other illegal activities - governments can be held accountable.

Right to Information is an important tool that can empower you to demand accountability from the government, proactively participate in public life and to fight corruption through knowledge. The value of access to information is recognised around the world and there are many countries where, both on paper and in practice, the Right to Information is a reality.

TIPNG’s Recommendations for Right to Information

- Support is required for the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (EITI) and OGP to achieve their broad objectives, but also specifically, to enact a Freedom of Information law.
- The Freedom of Information legislation should enable citizens to access public documents with support and oversight provided by an independent entity such as the Freedom of Information Commission.
- The public information accessed through the legislation must be accurate, accessible and provided in a timely manner.

NURTURING A GENERATION OF ACTIVE CITIZENS

Our team was in Bougainville in September to facilitate our Active Civic Engagement (ACE) workshop with young people of the region.

The Bougainville Active Civic Engagement workshop was held at the Tunuru Catholic Mission Station, Central Bougainville from September 19 to September 23, 2022.

The 2022 Bougainville ACE workshop saw 43 participants coming together from various district youth associations and schools around Bougainville.

The first session of the workshop was aimed at giving the participants a sense of pride and respect of where they are from and the districts they represent. Then, within their district groups, the participants listed out the issues affecting their communities.

Other sessions of the workshop covered: Representation, decision-making, active citizenship, leadership and role models, solutions, making a plan of action, utilizing the media and how to use social media.

The participants were also given the opportunity to listen and interact with their local Members of Parliament from the Autonomous Region of Bougainville, namely Honorable Junior Tumare, Member for Makis Constituency in South Bougainville and Minister for Lands, Physical Planning, Environment and Conservation, and North Bougainville Womens Representative, Ms Amanda Masono Getsi

TIPNG has been running its program in Bougainville since 2019. We have been able to do this with funding support from the PNG-Australia Partnership through Bougainville Partnership.

Bougainville Partnership, TIPNG and the Autonomous Bougainville Government's Community Development Department have been collaborating to strengthen and

enhance the capacity of youth organisation to meet the needs of young people of Bougainville as aspired in Bougainville's Strategic Development Plan 2018 – 2022.

Through the ACE program, we have been privileged to engage with young people from the Bougainville Youth Federation and the 16 District Youth Associations on the island of Bougainville.

Civic engagement is when an individual or a group of people seek to address public concerns to better the community. Its about people recognizing a problem and utilising available resources and expertise to fix the problem.

The aim of the program is to help motivate individuals to take ownership of addressing issues in their communities by developing a plan of action.

The ACE program takes a hands-on approach for participants to devise action plans that would enhance the well-being of their communities.






SETTING THE COMMUNITY COALITION AGAINST CORRUPTION

The first Community Coalition against Corruption (CCAC) was held this quarter with longtime key members and was chaired by TIPNG Chair Mr. Peter Aitsi. Organisations represented at the CCAC meeting were Caritas PNG, Media Council of PNG, Consultative Implementation Monitoring Council, Center for Environmental Law and Community Rights, Catholic Bishops Conference, Advancing PNG! Women Leaders Network and Transparency International PNG. The objectives of the CCAC meeting were to provide an overview of the CCAC and have discussions on the set up of the coalition. At the meeting, members agreed anonymously for the CCAC to be co-chaired by TIPNG and the Media Council of PNG. A second meeting will be held again in due time with a wider audience to firm up the structure of the CCAC.

The Community Coalition Against Corruption or CCAC is a loose body of network, that comprise of organizations who are committed to stand together against corruption.



The CCAC works through its membership to empower communities in three (3) ways:

1. Inform
2. Mobilize, and
3. Take action

2022 NGE DIAGNOSTIC FORUM ON WOMEN'S PARTICIPATION

The Integrity of Political Parties and Candidates Commission (IPCC) with the support of the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) conducted a three-day Diagnostic Workshop in Port Moresby on women candidates' participation in the National General. The theme of the workshop was Strategizing for Success: Documenting lessons learnt by female candidates to inform action planning for the 2027 elections. The workshop's aims were:

1. To bring together women candidates and a range of stakeholders together to share women candidate's experiences during the elections from across the country;
2. To start preparing for women's participation in the 2027 national general election, by critically reflecting on experiences; challenges and accomplishments from 2022 and producing practical recommendations for action by the PNG Government, PNG election-related institutions, women candidates and development partners.

TIPNG was invited to participate on a panel discussion at this event. TIPNG's Deputy Director for Partnerships & Policy Mr. Yuambari Haihuie spoke on the panel about the preparation, conduct and the delivery of the 2022 NGE.

7TH STATE OF THE PACIFIC CONFERENCE, CANBERRA

Through an invitation from the Department of Pacific Affairs and the Pacific Research Program of the Australian National University, TIPNG CEO, Ms. Arianne Kassman made a presentation on the 2022 PNG National General Elections and Challenges for Democracy.

Ms. Kassman's presentation covered key issues that were identified during the elections but focused more on the key recommendations to make elections better.

The State of the Pacific conference 2022, which took place from 28-29 September 2022 at The Australian National University in Canberra, covered the following range of topics:

- Issues of region-wide relevance, such as climate change, security, and labour mobility;
- Issues of national politics and development, such

- Issues concerning people and communities, including conceptualizations of masculinities and feminisms.

PNG NRI extended an invitation to TIPNG be part of the dialogue to discuss lessons from the 2022 National General Elections and strategies to prepare well for the 2027 National General Elections. Our presentation focused on our recommendations outlined in our elections summary.

MEETING UNODC'S DEPUTY REGIONAL REPRESENTATIVE TO STRENGTHEN ANTI-CORRUPTION EFFORTS IN PNG

We had the opportunity to meet with the Mr. Julien Garsany and Mr. Graham Gunn of the UN Office of Drugs and Crimes (UNODC) towards the end of this quarter. Mr. Garsany is the UNODC's Deputy Regional Representative Southeast Asia and the Pacific and Mr. Gunn is the UNODC's Anti-Corruption Adviser based in Papua New Guinea.

The UNODC as the UN agency mandated to address

corruption has been a long standing support and partner to TIPNG and anti-corruption efforts in Papua New Guinea. In this regard, the UNODC leads the processes on the UN Convention Against Corruption (UNCAC) which the PNG Government ratified in 2007. 2022 TIPNG NATIONAL GENERAL

We recently concluded our 4th consecutive Domestic Election Observation of the National General Elections (NGE) of Papua New Guinea. From our preliminary findings, we noted accumulated failures in the preparation, conduct, delivery and conclusion of the 2022 NGE have resulted in a severely flawed electoral process. Large swathes of the country could not freely, fairly or safely exercise their democratic right to vote and consequently are not represented in the 11th National Parliament.

In 2022 TIPNG was accredited with the PNG Electoral Commission (PNGEC) as a Domestic Election Observer Group. We have also observed the 2007, 2012 and 2017 National General Elections, with teams of volunteers across the country, using the same observer survey instruments, and also the 2013 LLG elections, 2019 Bougainville Referendum and the 2021 Moresby Northwest By-election.

Elections are a key period where citizens can take action against corruption, either through voting for candidates and parties with a clear and deliverable agenda for anti-corruption or through opposing electoral corruption.

From our fieldwork collecting data at polling stations we have compiled observer reports for the last 3 National Elections and given to both the government and the PNGEC to inform reform efforts. Reports from these observations have been presented to the PNGEC and Government to lead reforms such as the introduction of the Limited Preferential Voting (LPV) voting system and the Organic Law on the Integrity of Political Parties and Candidates (OLIPPAC).

Our election observers were trained to understand the whole election cycle and the laws relating to elections. TIPNG's observation focused on the environment and the process of polling.


